Meadow Lane Playground Survey

January 2023

The Playground for children up to 8 is very popular and well used. It is managed and maintained by the Council. Residents had raised concerns that it was starting to deteriorate and prone to flooding to IFRA. It was visited on 12 January 2023 with Cllr Chris Jarvis.

Flooding

The Playground and most of the equipment were surrounded by puddles. There had been a lot of rain before we visited so this was unusually bad. However, there are perennial problems with bad puddles in winter by the gates, which could be addressed.





The gates

The gate to the playground are no longer self-closing and so often remain open, risking small children going out on to Meadow Lane and dogs getting in.

These have now been fixed by ODS – thanks.

The fencing

Between the park and Meadow Lane field the fence is made of wire which is falling apart with lots of large holes in. The stile should either be removed or improved. Upgraded fencing would be appreciated here.



Wibbly Wobbly Bridge



Rather than waiting another 6+ months for wood (why does wood take 6 months to arrive?), would a similar arrangement to the Florence Park wobbly bridge be possible – see photo – as a better alternative?

This has been dismantled and replacement wood has been ordered but is unlikely to arrive until the autumn. We wondered if some temporary arrangement might be made in the meantime.



Swings

The right hand bolt into the post of the toddler swing closest to the main yellow gate moves with the swing and could come off – this is unsafe and should be fixed ASAP.



The house



The house is very popular. We noticed that the entrance had a pathway material that gave access through the puddles. We wondered if this might be used in future to give access to other equipment.

The seats inside are losing their edges and need replacing.



Parallel Bars

These were placed by the edge to the Recreation ground but were removed recently. We are not sure why and would like them replaced.

Zip Wire

We were pleased to see the ground had been resurfaced. We noted that the launch platform is beginning to show signs of deterioration and will need some attention in the future.



Sandpit

The sand is now very old and needs a new load of sand to make it nice to play in (compare with the sand in Florence Park which is much newer and more pleasant to use)



The See-saw



The see-saw seemed to have some loose screws and some the wood has deteriorated. While it seemed safe, it may need to be reviewed.

This seesaw is not safe. The wood has splintered and is dangerous. This seesaw needs to be replaced entirely with a better one as it is also too stiff for toddlers to use on their own so a new design should be considered.

Ideas for more equipment

There is plenty of space in the playground for new equipment, on both sides of the entrance from Meadow Lane and also behind the slide. Ideas include:

- Replacement seesaw (£?)
- Mini bowl spinner (£1400?)
- Climbing traverse wall or traversing forest (£1000-2600)
- Stepping Stones (£800)
- Log Rope bridge (£1800)
- Trampoline in the ground (£6000, too expensive)
- Musical instrument / xylophone / tubular bells (£2400+)



Conclusions

Overall, it is an attractive playground with a good balance of play activities. It is very much appreciated by children and their parents and grandparents.

It is, however, beginning to show signs of wear and tear and many areas may need renovation in the next year.

Areas for attention: ODS / OCC

- 1. Puddles by the gates. While some flooding after rain is inevitable, given its position, the well-worn areas by the gates should be improved.
- 2. Fencing repair
- 3. Toddler swing repair
- 4. Wobbly Bridge: whether a temporary replacement can be made to the wibbly wobbly bridge while we await the arrival of the wood that has been ordered. Or a permanent replacement more similar to the Florence park bridge that will be in place more quickly.
- 5. Parallel bars: the reason the parallel bars were recently removed and when they will be replaced?
- 6. Sandpit new load of sand
- 7. Seesaw removal (and replacement)
- 8. House seating repair
- 9. Surfaces around the activities to be monitored especially zip line

Responsibilities: Will the above repair and maintenance items be the responsibility of ODS / OCC, and will they additionally have any budget for a new seesaw, replacement parallel bars and any new equipment?

New equipment: we (as an IFRA parent group) would support an application by IFRA for new equipment from the councillors' fund. This would be for new items, rather than replacing what was there already, what has broken or what has been taken away.
